About Acted

With a 31-year history of going the last mile to support the most vulnerable worldwide, Acted is independent, private, and non-profit an international non-governmental organization that implements emergency, rehabilitation, and development projects across 43 countries affected by conflicts, disasters, or socioeconomic hardship. Adhering to a strict political and religious impartiality, Acted has been relentlessly working towards a "3ZERO" world: Zero Exclusion, because nobody should be left behind; Zero Carbon,

because we only have one ACTED operational presence in Ukraine, September 2024 planet; and Zero Poverty, because everyone should have the opportunity to realize their potential. For more than three decades, Acted uses its in-depth knowledge of local territories and contexts to develop and implement relevant humanitarian interventions, reaching over 27.1 million people in hard-toreach areas in collaboration with a wide range of local and international partners.

Acted Ukraine

Acted has been operational in Ukraine since 2015, responding to emergency and



longer-term needs of vulnerable, marginalised, and conflict-affected populations living along the former Line of Conflict (LoC) in Donetska and Luhanska oblasts, expanding operations into Khersonska and the Sea of Azov area in late 2021. After February 2022, Acted significantly expanded its presence and capacity countrywide. With 13 offices across Ukraine and over 500 staff, Acted has the capacity to reach all Ukrainian-controlled territory and parts of Non-Government Controlled Areas (NGCA) remotely. Acted delivers tailored and evidence-based assistance to people in need across three area contexts (frontline, early recovery, and IDPhosting) via the programming streams mentioned below.

Main areas of intervention

- Humanitarian cash assistance (MPCA, cash-for-heating, cash-for-shelter repairs, emergency livelihood grants)
- Frontline response (hygiene kits, bottled and trucked water, emergency shelter materials, NFIs, solid fuel)
- Collective sites and IDP support
- Area-based coordination

- Shelter repairs (households, hospitals, schools)
- Bomb shelter repairs •
- Water and sanitation systems rehabilitations
- Water and sanitation safety plans
- Economic employment security and opportunities

In 2024, Acted continues to deliver vital multi-sectoral humanitarian assistance through the Acted-led Ukraine Response Consortium, which started its operations in June 2022. Together with partners IMPACT Initiatives, World Vision, CARE, Right to Protection, the Estonian Refugee Council, and 50 national implementing partners, Acted provides support through **66 activities** under **7 sectors**: multi-purpose cash assistance, water, sanitation and hygiene support, food aid, shelter solutions, protection services, livelihoods support and coordinated humanitarian information management across Ukraine. The Consortium has already reached **779,908 beneficiaries** in the first phase of this multi-faceted emergency response and plans to reach **744,000 individuals** more by the end of the ongoing phase.

Acted also maintains its highly targeted multi-sectoral program funded by ECHO since

2022. In partnership with the Estonian Refugee Council, Acted is delivering emergency multi-purpose cash transfers, cash for heating and shelter and winterization support to 32,483 of the most vulnerable conflictaffected people, with a focus on those residing in nongovernment-controlled areas, along frontlines and in accessible territories. Complementing this newly emergency aid, Acted and ERC developed and rolled out an emergency livelihoods assistance program, providing 1,200 grants in rural communities to support entrepreneurship, small businesses and income generation activities.

In addition, Acted maintains its multiyear SEED project aimed at securing economic empowerment opportunities for women, girls and marginalized groups impacted by the conflict. Key interventions include disbursing livelihoods grants, providing education skills-training and scholarships, conducting local economic assessments, building capacities of labor centers and CSOs, running an interactive high school education and skills for rebuilding campaign, and establishing daycare centers and other community initiatives. The SEED project is expected to benefit an estimated 179,000 vulnerable people, with a minimum of 65% women and girls.

Future vision. Looking ahead to 2025-26, Acted will sustain the Ukraine Response Consortium's comprehensive support across all sectors, while continuing to develop its emergency cash transfers and livelihoods assistance program based on acute needs. The SEED project will also intensify economic empowerment activities in target areas. Facilitating access to skills, jobs and income streams remains a core priority alongside emergency relief.
