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Globally, Acted operates across diverse regions, including Africa, America, Asia, the Caribbean, Europe, and the Middle East, promoting a world of Zero Carbon, Zero Exclusion, and Zero Poverty. As part of its 30-year journey across 43 countries, Acted has remained committed to realism, humility, and ambition—its core values: responsibility, impact, enterprising spirit, and inspiration. Guided by its ethos of "Acted today | Invest in tomorrow," Acted's mission is to save lives and support people in meeting their needs in hard-to-reach areas.

In Bangladesh, Acted continues to build on its legacy of innovation and community-driven solutions to create lasting, meaningful change. Since August 2017, nearly one million Rohingya refugees have been forced to displace from Myanmar into Bangladesh. As of December 2024, 1,005,520 Rohingya refugees reside in 33 camps in Cox's Bazar and in Bhasan Char. The Government of Bangladesh has led a large-scale humanitarian response to support the displaced population. Since 2018, Acted has focused primarily on the Rohingya refugee response in Cox's Bazar and the host communities affected by the crisis. From 2025 to 2027, Acted Bangladesh aims to expand into hard-to-reach regions through a strategy built on five pillars: humanitarian response, WASH, digital inclusion, CSO support, and green economy. This forward-looking plan focuses on resilience, inclusive development, and sustainability. By strengthening local systems and aligning with key SDGs, Acted is preparing to deliver impactful, community-driven interventions across underserved areas of Bangladesh.



In 2024, Acted continued its mission in Bangladesh, delivering impactful humanitarian and development projects in Cox's Bazar and Bhasan Char, home to one of the world's largest refugee crises. With a focus on both Rohingya refugees and host communities, Acted implemented six projects to address critical needs, covering all 33 Rohingya camps in Cox's Bazar to support 195,713 families through multisectoral interventions, as well as supporting Bhasan Char Rohingya settlement with Information Management activities, ensuring broad long-term benefits aligned with Acted's 3ZERO vision.



In 2024, Acted Bangladesh remained committed to supporting vulnerable communities through integrated humanitarian and long-term resilience programming across multiple sectors. Acted remains a key actor in the Rohingya response, providing Site Management Support (SMS) in five camps, improving drainage in 16 camps, and restoring camp canal infrastructure. Protection efforts fostered social cohesion, supported persons with specific needs, and created safe spaces in six camps and a transit center. Another core focus has been WASH programming through waste management and hygiene awareness interventions, as well as training and livelihoods opportunities for 90 Rohingya women through hygiene kit production. Furthermore, Acted strengthened emergency preparedness by training volunteers and teachers in fire safety and maintaining mobile fire units. Through climate-resilient infrastructure, slope stabilization, and forestry, Acted promoted disaster resilience and environmental stewardship in Rohingya settlements. Across all 33 camps in Cox's Bazar and Bhasan Char, Acted has further supported evidence-based humanitarian action by conducting assessments and GIS mapping, enhancing coordination and informed decision-making through Information Management activities.

Acted Bangladesh contributed to a Zero Carbon future through diverse initiatives in Cox's Bazar. 14,556 trees were planted in 2024 to enhance biodiversity and reduce deforestation. This includes pilot activities to boost fauna diversity by planting flowering and fodder plants at selected sites. Recent assessments of the Camp 4 settlement recorded 23 butterfly species, 4 dragonflies, 2 lizards, 3 snakes, 4 amphibians, 4 rodents, and diverse bird species. Acted Bangladesh also conducted an assessment of our environmental impact at the mission level and implemented measures as a result, such as reducing plastic waste and improving recycling practices. These efforts supported Acted's 3Zero vision, fostering environmental sustainability for Rohingya refugees and host communities.

Acted promoted Zero Exclusion by fostering inclusivity and resilience in Cox's Bazar refugee camps. Community-based protection and SMS activities strengthened access to services, feedback mechanisms, community engagement and community leadership. Over 17,710 women participated in Cash-for-Work programs, volunteering, and skills-building activities, promoting empowerment and inclusion. Acted also supported Persons with Disabilities (PwD), and vulnerable groups, ensuring their representation in decision-making as a part of community-based protection (CBP) and SMS activities. Social cohesion was enhanced through cultural and sports events, religious engagement activities, and outreach programs. These initiatives reflect Acted's commitment to inclusive development and its 3Zero vision of Zero Exclusion.

In 2024, Acted Bangladesh advanced towards Zero Poverty through initiatives focused on economic empowerment and sustainable livelihoods in Cox's Bazar refugee camps. Over 21,847 individuals, including women and vulnerable groups, participated in Cash-for-Work programs, skills-building sessions, and livelihoods activities, fostering financial independence. Acted supported reforestation and infrastructure projects, creating jobs while improving the environment. Through training, refugees gained skills for long-term resilience. These efforts highlight Acted's commitment to reducing poverty and building sustainable futures for marginalized communities in line with its 3Zero vision.



Pillar 1: Humanitarian Emergency and Response



Acted will strengthen humanitarian interventions in crisis-affected, hard-to-reach areas through risk assessment, prepositioned warehouses, and coordinated response mechanisms. This will ensure timely assistance while preventing service overlaps. The approach aligns with SDG 1: No Poverty, SDG 2: Zero Hunger, SDG 5: Gender Equality, SDG 10: Reduced Inequalities, SDG 13: Climate Action, and SDG 15: Life on Land by addressing vulnerabilities, food security, gender needs, and climate-related challenges.



Pillar 2: Community Integrated WASH Systems




Acted will enhance WASH accessibility by involving communities in infrastructure design, monitoring, and maintenance. Government partnerships will promote inclusive policies, while advocacy campaigns foster sustainability and community ownership. This aligns with SDG 5: Gender Equality, SDG 6: Clean Water and Sanitation, SDG 8: Decent Work and Economic Growth, and SDG 13: Climate Action, ensuring equitable access, employment opportunities, and climate-resilient water and sanitation solutions.



Pillar 3: Access to Information through Digitalization



Acted will bridge the digital divide by improving internet connectivity, providing information hubs, and promoting gender-responsive SMS services. Digital skills training will expand economic opportunities, while streamlined data systems enhance disaster preparedness and decision-making. This aligns with SDG: Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure, SDG 10: Reduced Inequalities, SDG 16: Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions, and SDG 17: Partnerships for the Goals, fostering innovation, inclusion, and governance.



Pillar 4: CSO Support and Area-Based Planning



Acted will strengthen Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) by enhancing governance, resource management, and advocacy skills through its CATALYST and mentorship program. By aligning CSOs with government development plans, Acted promotes coordinated, localized interventions. This supports SDG 1: No Poverty, SDG 10: Reduced Inequalities, SDG 11: Sustainable Cities and Communities, SDG 13: Climate Action, and SDG 17: Partnerships for the Goals through capacity building and inclusive development.



Pillar 5: Green Economy and Environmental Resilience



Acted will promote sustainable livelihoods and climate resilience by training Community Environmental Groups (CEGs), fostering eco-tourism, and advancing green economy initiatives. Local stakeholder engagement ensures tailored solutions to environmental stressors. This aligns with SDG 11: Sustainable Cities and Communities, SDG 12: Responsible Consumption and Production, SDG 14: Life Below Water, and SDG 15: Life on Land, addressing ecosystem restoration, resource efficiency, and biodiversity conservation.

Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM)

Acted, as a global leader in Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM), has played a vital role in Bangladesh's Rohingya refugee response since 2018, serving as an SMS agency in collaboration with UNHCR in Bangladesh. In 2024, Acted implemented CCCM interventions across five camps, focusing on enhancing coordination, fostering community participation, building capacity, and strengthening emergency preparedness and response systems in line with the SPHERE minimum standards.

Acted facilitated 59 Camp Coordination meetings and 378 Sector Coordination meetings, engaging Health, Education, NFI, Nutrition, Communication with Communities (CwC), Food Security and Livelihoods (FSL), Agriculture, Protection, WASH, Law Enforcement, Case Management, Camp in Charge (CiC) officials, and Community Representatives, improving collaboration, and Complaints Feedback and Response Mechanism (CFRM) integrity. Acted maintained a pool of 430 volunteers (325 male, 105 female) in SMS activities under Cash for Work, including 33 skilled team leaders and 397 semi-skilled workers, ensuring effective project implementation throughout the period.

In 2024, Acted's SMS teams and volunteers ran five CFRM desks across five camps, collecting 34,992 community complaints to ensure voices were heard and needs addressed. Acted conducted awareness sessions for 523,508 total participants on various session topics like Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG) safety, cyclone preparedness, fire safety, and more. Among the attendees, 280,732 (53.63%) were women and 242,776 (46.37%) were men. The sessions also covered SMS volunteer roles, responsibilities, and various community safety issues. Acted facilitated 213 thematic group meetings in 2024, involving men, women, adolescents/youth, and elderly committees across Acted SMS agency camps. These groups supported community-led initiatives (CLIs), fire prevention, human trafficking awareness, and other initiatives, fostering community engagement and capacity building in decision-making processes. Acted implemented both incentivized and non-incentivized CLIs for camp infrastructure (pathways, access roads, ramps, railings, bamboo and wooden bridges). 460 incentivized schemes involved 1,841 residents (1,502 men, 339 women), including 274 People with Disabilities (96 men, 178 women), while non-incentivized activities focused on infrastructure maintenance.

In this year, Acted Bangladesh continued to strengthen emergency preparedness and response systems within camp settlements, focusing on enhancing community resilience to disasters. Through targeted interventions, Acted built the capacity of volunteers, staff, and community members to respond effectively to fire, water, and flood-related emergencies.

Key activities included fire safety training for 3,300 Site Management Support Volunteers (SMSVs) and Disaster Management Unit (DMU) volunteers, equipping them with the necessary skills to mitigate and respond to fire hazards within the camps. Recognizing the importance of educational settings for preparedness, 245 Learning Center (LC) teachers received training on fire, water, and flood safety to ensure preparedness within schools and the broader community. The teacher training served as a Training of Trainers (ToT), with teachers leading fire, water and flood safety sessions for students at the learning center. Acted also conducted household fire prevention management training.

The training was initiated to raise awareness among residents about safe cooking practices and fire preventive measures through providing training session for 8,168 individuals. To enhance the functionality and effectiveness of emergency fire response, especially for narrow road conditions in the camp, Acted provided repair and maintenance services for all 59 Mobile Fire Fighting Units (MFFUs) vehicles and 585 portable pumps. Additionally, Acted conducted basic training to volunteers operating these units in repair and maintenance of MFFUs. SMSV/DMU volunteers received specialized water and flood safety training to strengthen their ability to respond during seasonal flooding and water-related incidents.

By addressing multiple dimensions of emergency preparedness, Acted trained 13,509 beneficiaries in 2024 through 683 training sessions with support from ECHO and UNHCR in Bangladesh. These comprehensive efforts improved the technical capacity of SMSV/DMU volunteers and increased community ownership through awareness and preparedness.

Acted Bangladesh has made significant contributions in Natural Resource Management (NRM) to enhance climate resilience, improve infrastructure, and promote environmental sustainability in Cox's Bazar camp settlements. Implemented across 11 camps in collaboration with the World Food Programme (WFP), the project focused on constructing and maintaining climate-resilient infrastructure, reforestation, stabilizing slopes, and developing and maintaining effective drainage systems. A key aspect of the NRM project was the construction of 53 climate-resilient structures, including five biological slope stabilization structures that leverage Nature Based Solutions (NBS) to ensure that essential facilities can withstand extreme weather conditions and continue to provide long-term benefits. Acted prioritised inclusivity by renovating 29 public facilities to be accessible for Persons with Disabilities (PwDs), promoting equitable facility access. To address flooding and waterlogging, 6,292 meters of new drainage systems were constructed, significantly improving the management of stormwater in the camps.

Slope stabilization was a vital intervention to reduce the risk of landslides and erosion in the hilly terrain of the camps. By constructing, maintaining, and repairing 35 stabilization structures, Acted not only safeguarded critical camp infrastructure and housing but also protected pathways and drainage systems in the camp. In 2024, a total of 76,420 seedlings were maintained across 32.29 hectares of reforested area. The reforested land further supported slope stabilization by enhancing soil strength, improving water absorption, and creating a natural barrier against erosion. Additionally, the reforested areas contribute to climate regulation by providing shade and habitats for biodiversity. Acted also focused on restoring camp ecosystems through biodiversity enhancement, including experimental plantations of flowering and fodder plants, attracting diverse fauna like butterflies, birds, reptiles, and amphibians to regenerate habitats.

With over 20,000 expected direct and indirect beneficiaries, the NRM project improved living conditions, resilience, and environmental sustainability in the camps.

Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) Through Women's Empowerment

Bangladesh's WASH interventions in Cox's Bazar were instrumental in improving sanitation and hygiene conditions, with support from the Crisis and Support Centre (CDCS) of France Diplomatie and SUEZ Foundation. Acted worked to foster women's empowerment through participation of 41,586 individuals on awareness raising sessions on waste management and hygiene, and provision of training to 52 women on producing MHM and cleaning kits. Women and girls participated in tailored community sessions where they could discuss personal hygiene in a safe and supportive environment. These sessions focused on menstrual hygiene management (MHM), proper sanitation practices, and waste disposal, equipping women with essential knowledge to lead hygiene promotion efforts in their households and communities. In complement, Acted provided 78 Rohingya women with materials and skills development training to produce reusable MHM kits and cleaning kits in production centers in Camps 3 and 4.

Through CfW opportunities, these women not only earned an income but also contributed to improved hygiene standards within the camps. In total, 78 women enrolled in skill development .

Acted also established a Waste Management Brigade of 36 volunteers to support WASH sector activities in camp 1E, 3 and 4 through collecting waste, conducting waste management awareness sessions, and support to cleaning campaigns. Women played a vital role in waste management activities, leading awareness campaigns in markets and community spaces to promote hygiene and sanitation. These campaigns empowered women to sensitize others on proper waste disposal and environmental cleanliness. The Waste Management Brigade actively participated in waste collection efforts, ensuring regular collection and segregation of household and market waste. Their involvement fostered community ownership of sanitation initiatives and reinforced sustainable waste management practices within the camps.

The SuLMER project supports environmental restoration and watershed management in the Rohingya refugee camps in Cox's Bazar, helping protect people and nature in close collaboration with UNHCR in Bangladesh. Launched in 2021, SuLMER aims to restore and rehabilitate natural water systems through Nature-Based Solutions (NbS) that incorporate slope stabilization, stream excavation, and riparian planting using native species. These efforts mitigate disaster risks such as soil erosion, flooding during the monsoon, and fire hazards while providing a healthier environment for the community.

In 2024, the project continued its critical work in Camps 1W and 2W, with a catchment area covering 24 hectares, benefiting 30,639 refugees and 400 host community members. The watershed management plan focuses on improving water flow, restoring existing stream networks, and implementing sustainable land use practices. Acted's interventions directly benefited 1,220 refugee families by mitigating flash flood impacts, significantly enhancing living conditions.

The project trained 89 households in CfW programs, with male and female participation, providing community members with livelihoods while improving the watershed's functionality.

The reduction in flash flooding duration and waterlogging has led to a 50% decrease in the spread of diseases like dengue and malaria in camp stream area compared to 2023. Additionally, watershed functionality improved by 150%, increasing water flow capacity and reducing stagnation. Through vertical and over-stream gardening, 534 refugees now have access to fresh vegetables, promoting better nutrition and food security. Regular water quality tests indicate substantial improvements in stream health, attributed to consistent cleaning and waste removal efforts. The installation of waste traps in the stream canals has significantly improved waste management, reducing blockages and enhancing water flow, contributing to a better ecosystem. Community-led efforts, including riparian plantations, live fencing, and soil stabilization, have significantly reduced soil erosion and promoted long-term ecological balance.

Acted's Community-Based Protection (CBP) programming in the Rohingya refugee camps fosters community leadership, protection, and social cohesion in collaboration with UNHCR in Bangladesh. Acted has established 24 Community Groups (CGs) in six camps, comprising a total of 636 voluntary members. These groups lead initiatives to support vulnerable individuals, strengthen peaceful coexistence, and respond to disasters. In 2024, 444 Community-Led Initiatives (CLIs) were completed, including social cohesion activities, skills-building sessions, and infrastructure repairs.

Acted also manages a network of 150 Community Outreach Members (COMs) through which awareness sessions are conducted on protection issues such as fire prevention, disease control, and gender-based violence. In 2024, 655,786 individuals participated in these sessions, and 2,717 Persons with Specific Needs (PSNs) were identified through house visits, ensuring targeted support. COMs also led 101 community projects, benefiting 528 individuals through skills-building activities.

Acted's CBP team operates six Information Service Centers (ISCs) across the camps, facilitating information dissemination, service referrals, and complaint resolution. In 2024, 20,865 complaints were processed through Acted's Complaints and Feedback Mechanism (CFM). Additionally, six Community Centers (CCs) provided safe spaces for socialization, training, and emergency shelter, engaging 169,064 individuals.

Acted's Religious Engagement Program actively involves 221 Imams and 140 Female Religious Teachers (FRTs) in discussions on social issues, including child marriage and domestic violence sensitization. Furthermore, Acted supports Family Reunification to third countries by assessing cases and facilitating legal referrals. In the reporting period, 14 cases involving 41 individuals were processed, with 39 referred for reunification. Through these interventions, Acted continues to empower the Rohingya community, ensuring sustainable and community-driven protection mechanisms.

Acted's Information Management (IM) project, conducted in collaboration with UNHCR in Bangladesh, played a crucial role in ensuring data-driven interventions were at the core of the humanitarian response in the Rohingya refugee camps of Cox's Bazar. With the aim of enhancing programmatic effectiveness, the IM team conducted 6 comprehensive assessments, reaching a total of 9,203 individuals. These surveys provided key insights into the needs, challenges, and vulnerabilities faced by both the refugee and host communities, allowing for targeted interventions across various sectors, including WASH, shelter, and food security.

The IM project trained 337 enumerators to collect accurate and reliable survey data, ensuring consistency and representativeness in information gathering. In addition, 160 volunteers were trained in data collection techniques, further reinforcing the project's capacity to engage local communities and enhance the quality of data gathering. The team developed 111 detailed Geographic Information Systems (GIS) maps,

which served as vital tools for site planning, monitoring, and coordination. These maps provided clear visual representations of the camp layout, facilities, services, and infrastructure, which allowed stakeholders to improve resource allocation, plan new interventions, and monitor progress in real time and improve logistical response in the camps. To further build local capacity, 25 training sessions were held throughout the year, focusing on various aspects of data collection, analysis, and reporting. These sessions were designed to improve the quality of data and ensure that all team members, as well as partners, were equipped with the skills needed to manage and utilize data effectively.

The IM team played a key role in enhancing coordination and ensuring decisions were taken based on using accurate and up-to-date information. By leveraging data, the IM project contributed significantly to addressing the evolving needs of the refugees and host communities in Cox's Bazar.

In 2024, the Drain Monitoring Intervention (DMI) project focused on sanitation and flood resilience with support from UNHCR in Bangladesh across the Rohingya refugee camps in Cox's Bazar. The initiative maintained and rehabilitated the camp's drainage systems to reduce waterlogging, flash flooding, particularly during the monsoon season.

A total of 104,511 meters of drains were cleaned to support the drainage system's functionality. 209,663 cubic feet of soil/silt were excavated from the canal beds, enhancing the flow capacity and reducing blockages that contribute to flooding. Additionally, 35,471 cubic feet of waste was removed and transferred to designated locations, contributing to waste management and a cleaner environment.

The DMI project actively engaged the local community through 841 CfW participants, who contributed to drain cleaning, maintenance, and excavation activities.

This initiative provided refugees and host community members with essential livelihood opportunities, improving their economic stability and self-reliance. It also fostered a sense of ownership and responsibility among community members toward the camp's hygiene and infrastructure.

To ensure effective coordination and community engagement, 327 camp-level and WASH sector meetings were attended by DMI team members, ensuring that stakeholders were informed and involved in the project's progress. Furthermore, 87 DMI volunteers supported the community in implementing these activities, helping to raise awareness about the importance of proper drainage and waste management.

Through its comprehensive approach, the DMI project improved sanitation and flood resilience while providing vital income-generating opportunities to the most vulnerable populations, contributing to overall improved living conditions in the camps.



Our team consists of professionals from diverse backgrounds, each contributing their unique skills and experience to the success of our projects. From project management to field operations, every member of our staff plays a crucial role in implementing Acted's vision of Zero Exclusion, Zero Carbon, and Zero Poverty. Their hard work and dedication are central to the success of our activities, which aim to address the humanitarian, environmental, and development challenges faced by the Rohingya refugee community and host populations in Cox's Bazar.



Acted Bangladesh's Women's Network has strengthened inclusivity in the workplace, leading initiatives like the 16 Days of Activism and the Spring Festival. Acted introduced Pink Leave Day, ensured designated women's washrooms in Cox's Bazar office and camps, and fostered a supportive environment for women staff across operations.



Acted is also committed to fostering an inclusive and supportive work environment for its staff.
