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# a message from the ceo

For humanitarian action, 2025 was more than a crisis: it was a major tipping point. A year of brutal rupture, marked by a massive reduction in international funding for humanitarian aid and development.

This funding crisis has been compounded by a challenge to the very legitimacy of humanitarian action, creating growing uncertainty over the international community's medium-term willingness to honour its commitments to the Sustainable Development Goals.

International solidarity is narrowing. And this is happening at a time when crises are becoming ever more intertwined, mutually reinforcing and amplified — whether social, climatic, political or geopolitical. Crises no longer add up; they multiply. And the most vulnerable people are paying the highest price.

For Acted, as for all actors across the sector, this is nothing short of an earthquake. We must accept

that the world is changing — and reinvent ourselves while staying the course.

So, what are we to do?

Marcus Aurelius told us, in essence, that the obstacle is the way. We have no choice but to make this maxim our own — and move forward.

One thing is certain: this is not about changing our vision. Our direction, our values and our purpose remain unchanged. What must be accelerated is our proposal for a 3ZERO world: Zero Exclusion, Zero Carbon, Zero Poverty.

First, we must fundamentally rethink how we finance our action, and accelerate our transition towards HumaniTerra. We must also accelerate our work to build practical convergence — always one that lifts us higher — between public actors, private actors and civil society.

This is the full ambition of a 3ZERO world. Not three separate objectives, but one. A systemic vision that recognises that the crises we face are profoundly interconnected — and that solutions must be just as interconnected.

Second, while our work is rooted every day in the realities of the field, we cannot ignore the emergence of artificial intelligence. This emergence appears to herald a profound reconfiguration of how our societies function, at unprecedented speed, and to signal a fundamental shift in the very meaning of progress. It resembles a Promethean revolution, in which every human being will be compelled to ask what their place will be.

In response to this question, we choose to believe in an alliance between artificial intelligence, ancestral intelligence and adaptive intelligence.

Ancestral intelligence is the intelligence of territories, communities and rooted knowledge. This is where communities invent and experiment. This is where we must be — co-constructing solutions, bringing actors together, turning dialogue into collective action. Adaptive intelligence is the intelligence that has shaped humanity's path since it set human beings on a trajectory unlike that of any other living species.

We propose this new equation: AI3 — first and foremost, of course, for humanitarian action, but not only.



Third, we must accelerate our transition from humanitarian action to HumaniTerra. It is no longer only about helping to heal the world; it is about rethinking it. HumaniTerra must, more than ever, think outside the box. This has always been our slogan. It has even been our logo from the very beginning: never confuse constraints with limits; never mistake the box for the world.

Thinking outside the box means, first of all, rethinking and renewing our resources: diversifying our levers, strengthening our partnerships and, of course, evolving our action by investing more in human capital and innovation.

In Asia, Africa and the Americas — where our action has been concentrated since the beginning — we must deepen our engagement with the 1,500 national partners active at the first mile whom we have supported for years. We are opening our network of 3ZERO Houses to civil society actors, giving them greater strength and reach. We hope this will create accelerators for innovation and investment in the most deprived areas of the planet, with the Convergences Forums as their voice.

In Europe and in France, where we must also invest ourselves, our action has so far consisted in creating and carrying, for the past 15 years, the Convergences Forum in Paris — designed as a space for dialogue among all actors, to break down silos and challenge preconceptions. Some told us: “talk all you like.” Our answer is: “causes, always.”

We are now gradually building an ecosystem around the 3ZERO House in Paris, which has been active for one year and is already mobilising stakeholders. It will serve as the anchor point for a renewed Convergences, now focused on practical solutions with actors rooted in France. The enthusiasm it is generating must become the starting point for a far more ambitious vision: investing in promising initiatives led by civil society and small-scale entrepreneurship.

In parallel, from the Hermitage / 3ZERO European Campus, we intend to launch an initiative to support numerous hybrid places and the territories they each help to energise.

Together, all these initiatives should converge to become the first building blocks of the Global 3ZERO Alliance.

We know that our actions are modest, fragile and incomplete. But every time a community regains access to water, every time a child can eat their fill, every time a territory begins to regenerate, it is a victory.

Thank you to our teams, who continue to act with courage, creativity and commitment despite uncertainty. I want to pay particular tribute to all our colleagues across Acted's 40 countries of intervention for their remarkable crisis management following the dissolution of USAID, which today allows us to look to Acted's future on solid foundations. In doing so, they have made a decisive contribution to the organisation's sustainability. For this, my deepest thanks.



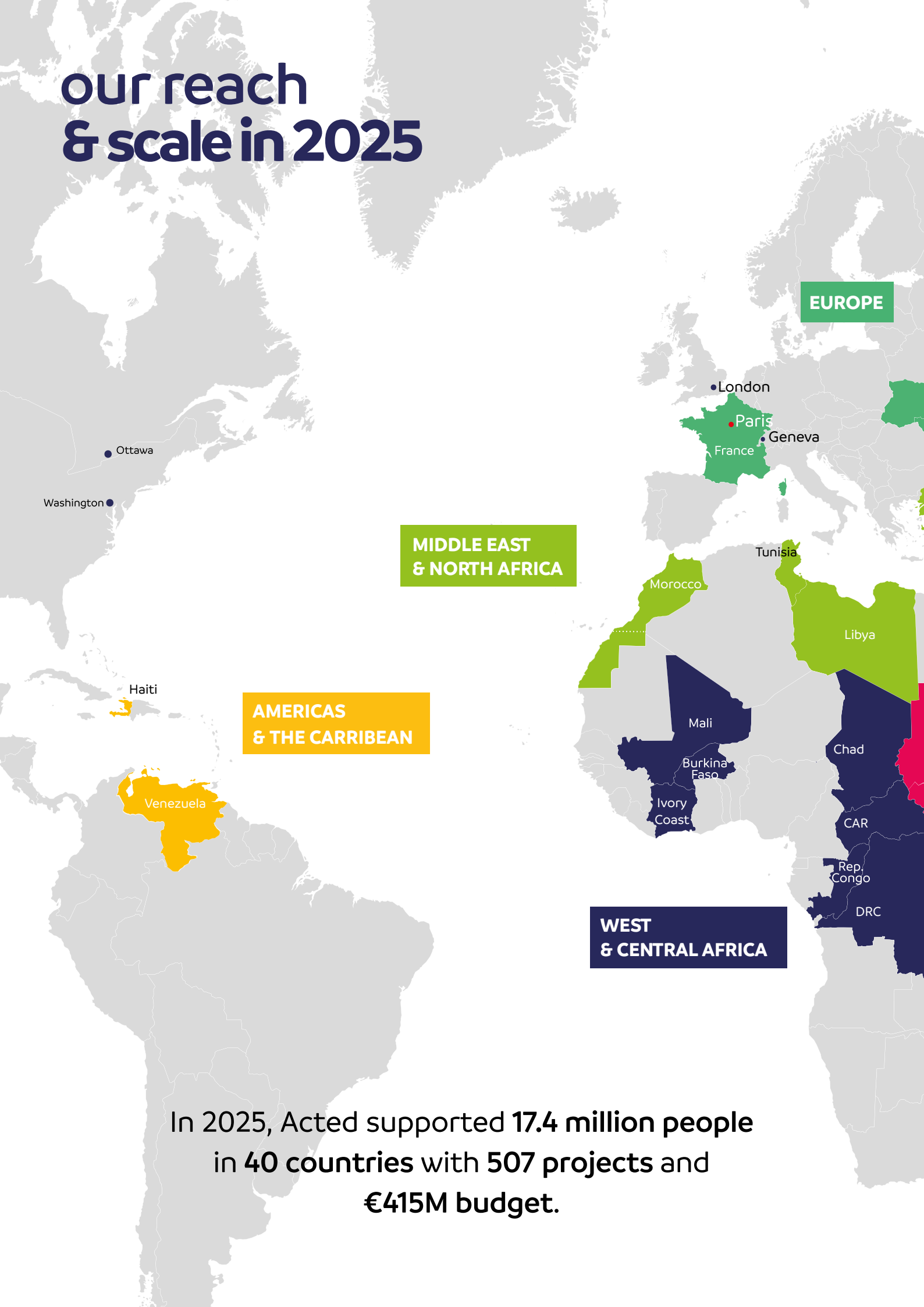

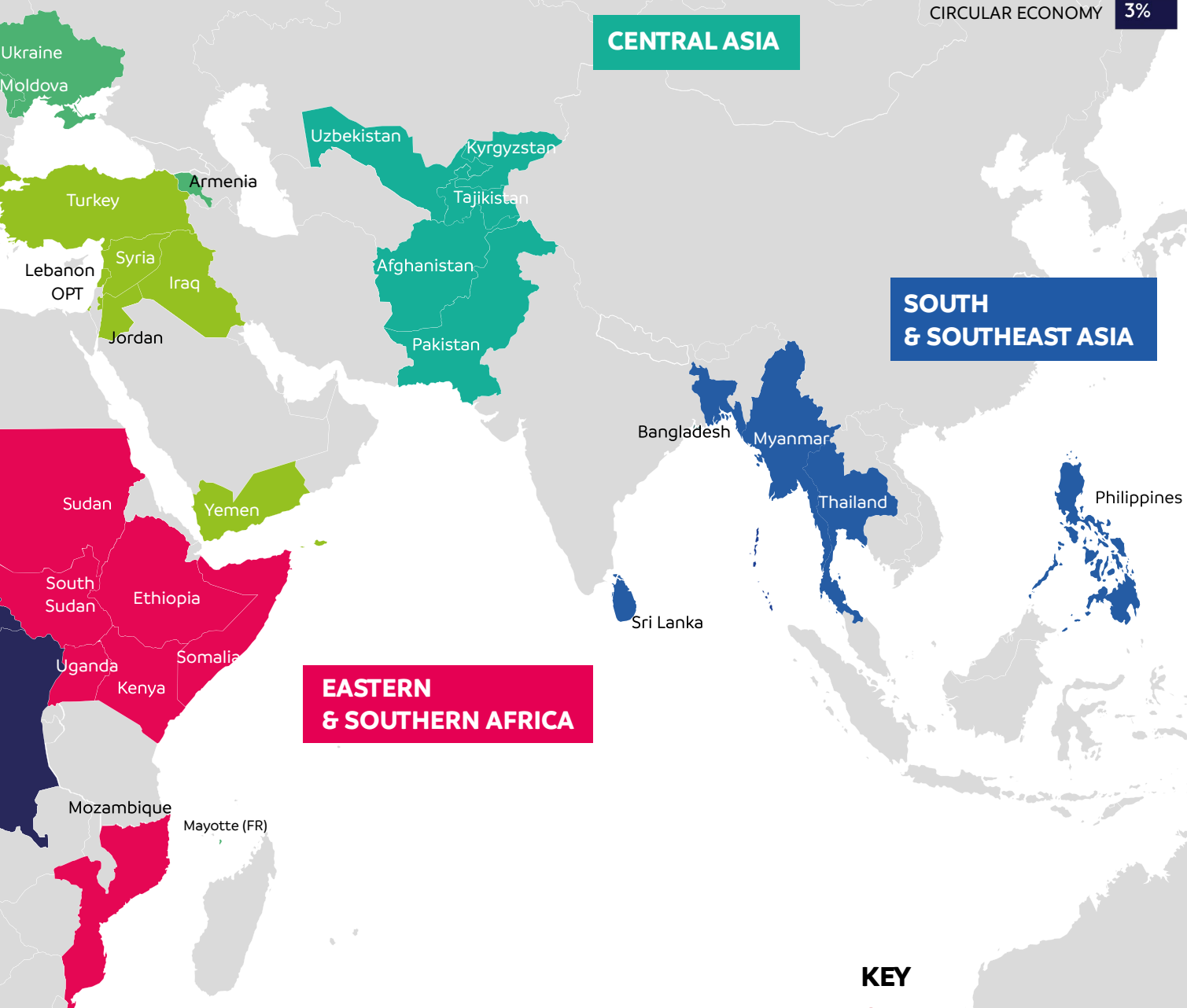

# key achievements



In Sudan, where violence has displaced more than 15 million people and driven millions into severe food insecurity, Acted partnered with local responder groups to operate community kitchens in some of the most hard-to-reach and conflict-affected areas. Through this locally led approach, communities were able to provide emergency food assistance to over 1 million people in 2025, helping vulnerable households meet urgent food needs despite insecurity, displacement and restricted humanitarian access.

In Yemen, where conflict and economic decline continue to undermine access to essential services, Acted rehabilitated water and sanitation infrastructure in health facilities serving vulnerable communities. As a result, over 450,000 people benefited from safer and more reliable healthcare services, with improved access to clean water, sanitation and hygiene facilities helping reduce health risks and improve the quality of care.

In Kenya's West Pokot County and the Tchologo region of northern Côte d'Ivoire, where climate change, land degradation and increasing pressure on natural resources threaten pastoral and agricultural livelihoods, Acted supported communities through its THRIVE approach to rehabilitate degraded ecosystems and improve natural resource management. Through ongoing landscape restoration, regenerative grazing and nature-based solutions, 3030 hectares of degraded land in Kenya and Côte d'Ivoire were placed under holistic management, helping strengthen climate resilience and support sustainable livelihoods.

In Afghanistan, Acted supported over 3,055 artisans MSMEs to strengthen livelihoods and expand economic opportunities through traditional crafts such as tailoring, embroidery and rugmaking. Focusing on women entrepreneurs, the project provided business development support and market linkages while helping artisans access national and international markets. Through business development services, technical training and market access support, the project helped artisan entrepreneurs strengthen their enterprises, reach new customers and create more sustainable livelihood opportunities for their families and communities.

# 2020-2025 programmatic strategy

## ACCESS TO BASIC SERVICES

Acted believes that equitable access to basic services such as drinking water, sanitation and hygiene facilities; essential health care; education; and energy; is key to successfully tackling poverty. Acted's activities aim at improving quality and coverage of services offered, especially for populations who live in places that are historically underserved, too geographically isolated, or economically marginalised.

## HUMANITARIAN ACTION

In emergencies, Acted responds to save lives, paying special attention to the most vulnerable and marginalised, and striving for delivery in hard-to-reach areas. Acted's humanitarian action includes disaster preparedness and early action; emergency response and recovery, and encourages future resilience and equitable development.

## INCLUSIVE ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES

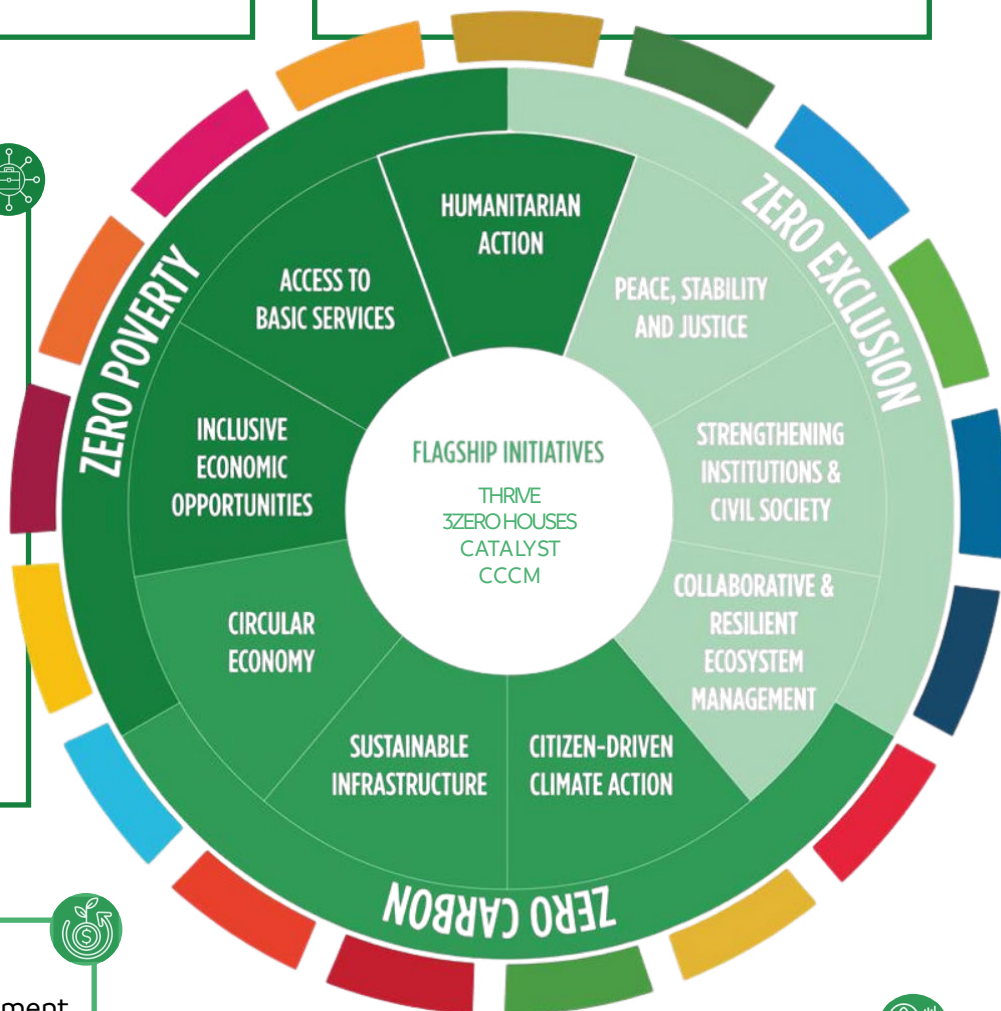
Acted encourages inclusive economic growth, that is distributed fairly across society, and creates opportunities for all, by ensuring individuals have adequate skills and capacities to access available livelihood opportunities, and that markets can offer decent employment or self-employment opportunities, especially in sectors where the poor and most vulnerable work, and in places where they live.

## CIRCULAR ECONOMY

Acted supports individuals, government institutions, service providers and social entrepreneurs to design out waste and pollution, to keep products and materials in use as long as possible, and to regenerate natural systems. These actions minimise waste, pollution and carbon emissions, and improve the productivity of resources, resulting in a reduction of the environmental impact of economic activity.

## SUSTAINABLE INFRASTRUCTURES

Acted promotes the designing, building and operating of infrastructure to meet the population's essential service needs on all-round sustainable principles. This means the infrastructure such as water supply systems or power stations is environmentally friendly from end to end, and that includes economic, financial, social and institutional factors.



## PEACE, STABILITY & JUSTICE



Acted works towards preventing conflict, supporting post-conflict stabilisation, and promoting social cohesion. This is done through improving trust between and within communities, reducing risk of violence, preventing outbreak of conflict, and promoting basic principles of the rule of law, such as access to justice.

## STRENGTHENING INSTITUTIONS & CIVIL SOCIETY



While empowering citizens to make demands and hold to account those who are responsible for delivering services, and at the same time supporting local institutions to provide better, more effective services to their constituents, Acted encourages different stakeholders — from groups of citizens, the private sector to governments — to work effectively together in co-constructing ways to act collectively in development processes.

## COLLABORATIVE & RESILIENT MANAGEMENT

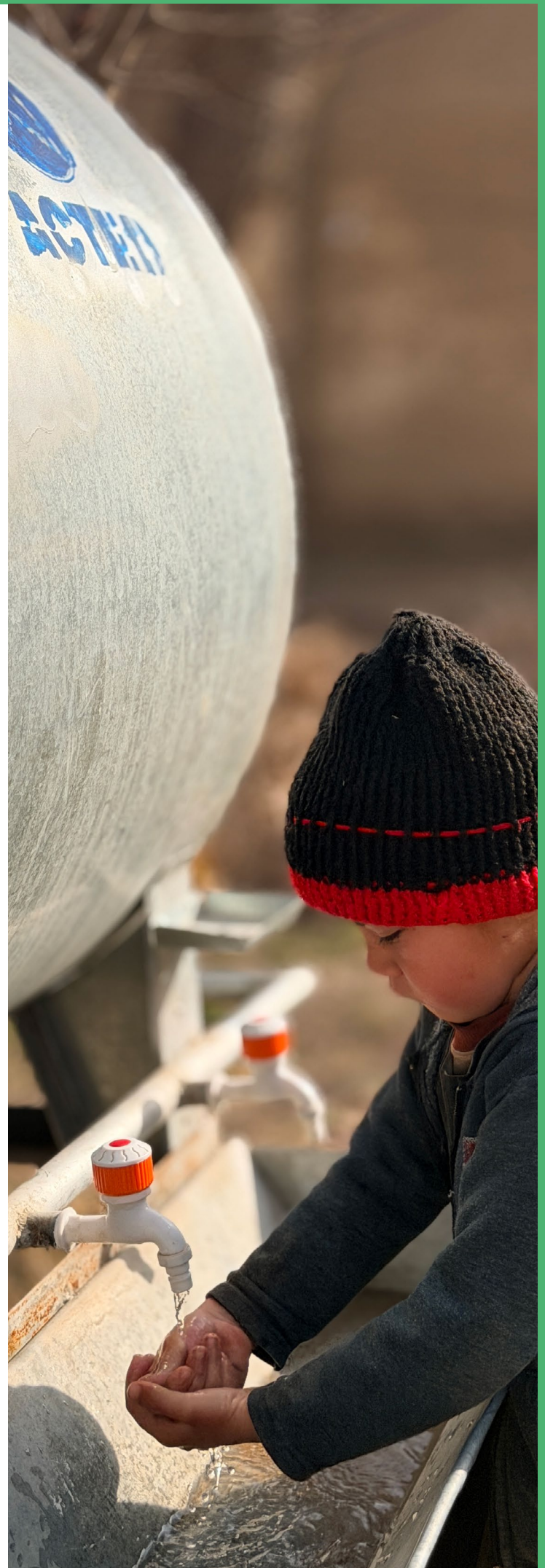


Human activities lead to reduction of biodiversity, exploitation of natural resources, pollution and land degradation, affecting ecosystems resilience. Acted aims to ensure that ecosystems and natural resources are regenerated, consumed, and protected in a more sustainable manner so that local populations can responsibly benefit from them to meet their needs, while conserving the ecosystems for future generations.

## CITIZEN-DRIVEN ACTION



With our planet experiencing significant and accelerated climate change, Acted promotes sustainable consumption and production at the individual and household level (e.g. awareness on measures to reduce water/electricity consumption), as well as collective advocacy and communication activities, to sensitize people about the environment and climate change and aims to bring about lifestyle changes.



# emergency response

2025 was marked by a continued intensification and overlap of crises. Humanitarian needs reached record levels, with an estimated 305 million people requiring assistance worldwide, according to United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA). Compounding shocks — including conflict, climate-related hazards and economic pressures — further exacerbated already fragile contexts and deepened vulnerabilities.

In response to these escalating needs, Acted deployed operations across 12 major humanitarian crises. Remaining true to its mandate as a first-mile actor and despite a contraction in international funding, Acted was able to mobilise effectively to deliver emergency assistance to more than 12,344,513 people.



## GAZA

In 2025, Acted stepped up its emergency response to support 1,206,491 people in the Gaza Strip amid an extremely constrained environment marked by war, severely limited humanitarian access, and the collapse of basic services. In response to these immense needs, Acted delivered multisectoral assistance covering food security, water and hygiene, and protection. Acted also played a key role in establishing a supply chain from Egypt and was a central actor in site management, committing to helping improve living conditions for displaced populations and strengthen response coordination.



## MYANMAR



200,000+ individuals assisted



11,932 households received multi-purpose cash



3,500 individuals involved in cash for work

On March 28, 2025, a magnitude 7.7 earthquake struck Myanmar near Mandalay, compounding a crisis already marked by conflict and forced population displacement. Infrastructure was extensively damaged, severely limiting access to safe drinking water, sanitation, and energy. Deployed within hours, Acted provided life-saving assistance to more than 200,000 people, combining emergency aid and community recovery support.



## MAYOTTE

In 2025, Acted upscaled its response following the passage of Cyclone Chido in Mayotte supporting 32,532 people. A central component of this response was the deployment of the **AGORA approach**, grounded in informal settlements of **Kawéni** and **Cavani**. This **area-based** approach made it possible to better account for local dynamics, strengthen community engagement, and optimise the targeting of interventions. It notably included the installation and management of sanitation infrastructure and waste management systems, as well as the implementation of economic recovery programmes.





## SUDAN

In Sudan, amid massive displacement of highly vulnerable populations fleeing the war, Acted deployed multisectoral emergency responses and cash transfer programmes to 2,004,808 people. In neighbouring countries, Acted focused on camp and site management, notably in Chad, and South Sudan, to improve reception conditions for displaced and refugee populations. Through these interventions, Acted contributed to strengthening humanitarian coordination, access to essential services, and the protection of the most vulnerable populations in environments marked by chronic instability and increased pressure on local resources.



## UKRAINE



474,334 people assisted



173,823 people benefited from water and sanitation activities

In Ukraine, Acted responded to the needs of 474,334 people living along the frontline and in areas affected by shelling by providing multisectoral assistance, particularly during the winter period to help communities cope with the harsh, freezing conditions. Acted also supported the rehabilitation of essential infrastructure to restore access to basic services and address the needs of people deprived of heating and electricity.



## DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO

In eastern DRC, the resurgence of armed conflict, in particular in Goma and Bukavu, triggered massive population displacement, exacerbating the chronic humanitarian crisis in the Kivu provinces. In response to the sharp rise in food insecurity and needs related to shelter, water, and protection, Acted immediately deployed a multisectoral response through the Rapid Response Mechanism (RRM), delivering life-saving assistance to more than 300,000 people.



## HAITI



1,223 people assisted



1,020 individuals received cash

In Haiti, the intensification of armed violence has led to massive displacement and a collapse in access to basic services, particularly in Port-au-Prince and Artibonite. The passage of Hurricane Melissa in November 2025 further worsened the situation, destroying homes and crops. In this severely degraded context, Acted implemented a multisectoral response, combining emergency assistance, cash transfers, and the distribution of emergency kits, reaching over 1,200 people.



## PAKISTAN, AFGHANISTAN, SRI LANKA, PHILIPPINES

2025 was also marked by localised shocks, including floods in Pakistan (August), major earthquakes in Afghanistan (August) and the Philippines (September), as well as Cyclone Ditwah, which struck Sri Lanka (November). Acted launched rapid responses, providing water, emergency shelter, and cash transfers to more than 50,000 individuals affected by these disasters.

# climate action

Acted recognises that human resilience and ecosystem resilience are inseparable.

Acted continued to strengthen its response to the climate and environmental crises as a core part of its humanitarian and development mandate. As climate change increasingly shapes people's lives, livelihoods and ecosystems, particularly in fragile and crisis-affected contexts, Acted supported communities to protect natural resources, reduce climate-related risks and build long-term resilience.

2025 marked the final year of Acted's 2021-2025 Greening Strategy, consolidating progress made across its four pillars: Mobilise, Measure, Reduce, and Adapt & Invest. Over the past five years, Acted significantly expanded its climate and environmental programming. The share of the **portfolio dedicated to climate and environmental action increased from 11% in**

**2021 to 22% in 2025**, bringing the organisation close to its 25% target. This work was structured across four thematic areas: collaborative and resilient ecosystem management (7%), citizen-driven climate action (6%), sustainable infrastructure (6%), and circular economy approaches (3%).

At the same time, Acted strengthened its internal systems for managing environmental impact, annual carbon footprinting, and decarbonisation. A bioclimatic construction toolbox was published to promote low-carbon, climate-adapted infrastructure. Staff awareness and behaviour-change initiatives were rolled out globally. Building on these foundations, Acted worked on the development of its Climate and Environment Framework 2026-2030. The new framework will deepen operational transformation through the implementation of a comprehensive Environmental and Social Management System (ESMS), while scaling climate and environment solutions co-designed with communities, mobilising a wide diversity of actors, and leveraging climate finance to strengthen locally driven resilience.

A landmark achievement in early 2025 was Acted's accreditation to the **Green Climate Fund (GCF)**, the world's largest multilateral climate fund. The accreditation recognises Acted's safeguards, standards and capacity to deliver large-scale climate projects in complex environments. Throughout the year, Acted teams mobilised to design its first GCF-funded programmes, building on years of experience in fragile contexts, scaling proven approaches, and working closely with institutions to sustain climate solutions. This marks a major step in bringing climate finance closer to vulnerable communities on the frontline of climate impacts.

# At country level,

Climate action is no longer at the margins of our work, but at the heart of how we design programmes, support communities and engage with partners. Acted stands alongside communities not only on the frontline of climate impacts, but also on the frontline of climate solutions.

**In Sri Lanka,** Acted launched its first Blue Economy initiative through the OCEANS programme, supporting coastal and marine ecosystems while improving the resilience of fishing communities. The project combines the restoration of mangroves, seagrass and coral reefs with climate-resilient livelihoods, climate-smart aquaculture and strengthened local governance to protect both ecosystems and incomes along vulnerable coastlines.




**In South Sudan,** one of the world's most climate-exposed and fragile contexts, Acted started to implement a large-scale EU-funded environmental rehabilitation project. The project links ecosystem restoration with food security and livelihoods, addressing the combined effects of climate stress, environmental degradation and displacement. By restoring productive landscapes while supporting rural livelihoods, the project contributes to context-specific community resilience.

## carbon footprint

**67,130** TOTAL EMISSIONS (tCO<sub>2</sub>)

Since 2021, emissions have been reduced by 27% and delivery efficiency has improved. As of 2025, emissions remain 3.5% above Acted's 30% reduction target. This is mainly due to structural factors (aid activities), expanded operations, logistics constraints, and higher data accuracy. To achieve its **50% reduction target by 2030**, Acted will further focus on the main sources of emissions, engagement with suppliers, and projects' decarbonation by design.

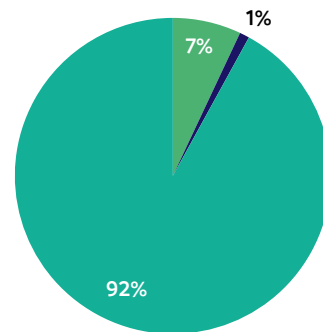

# ecosystems convening powers

As the world faces unprecedented multi-faceted crises, solutions are not only technical or financial - they are also relational and systemic.

Acting for change requires convening ecosystems beyond usual counterparts.

Guided by its objective of collectively building a world with **Zero Exclusion, Zero Carbon and Zero Poverty**, Acted acts as a catalyst, convening communities, civil society, public authorities, private sector actors and donors to shape collective responses. Through initiatives such as the **Convergences forums**, the global

network of **3ZERO Houses**, and partnerships with local and international organisations, Acted creates spaces for dialogue, collaboration and innovation. **By connecting local ecosystems with global conversations, Acted helps transform fragmented efforts into shared solutions for a more just and sustainable future.**

## 3ZERO Houses | Collaborative and innovative spaces

In 2025, the 3ZERO House network evolved into a multi-stakeholder movement for local transformation. Across Asia and Africa, 2,712 young people, 350 civil society organisations, and 149 small and medium-sized enterprises took part in training sessions and collaborative activities, strengthening both their skills and local dynamics.

From Tajikistan to Myanmar, via the Philippines, Kenya, Sri Lanka, and Libya, the 3ZERO Houses reaffirmed their role as hubs for connection and collective action. They enabled 71% of participants to move beyond siloed approaches, while 93% viewed them as innovative initiatives addressing essential social, economic, and environmental needs.

Through their incubation programmes, the 3ZERO Houses supported initiatives in agroecology, the circular economy, and sustainable waste management. Among these, AGC Innovate in Sri Lanka transforms plastic waste into construction materials, while ShambaAI in Kenya provides farmers with artificial intelligence tools to improve yields and strengthen resilience.

Far more than physical spaces, the 3ZERO Houses are platforms for co-creation, where communities design and implement solutions to some of the most pressing challenges they face. In doing so, they continue to demonstrate their role as catalysts for sustainable, locally rooted transformation.



## CATALYST | Supporting Civil Society Organisations

In 2025, Acted continued to strengthen civil society worldwide through CATALYST, a programme that has supported over 3,500 organisations across 20 countries since 2015, helping them improve governance, management, and autonomy.

With a 90% success rate, CATALYST has proven highly effective, as illustrated in Uzbekistan under the EU-funded EQUALITY Phase II programme, where Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) were strengthened to address gender-based violence, promote women's

economic empowerment, and engage in advocacy. Among them, Belyi Parus—initially the lowest-scoring organisation among 30 CSOs—strengthened its internal systems, implemented two small-grant projects for vulnerable groups, and secured eight additional grants.

Building on these successes, CATALYST will continue to capitalise on such impact stories in the years ahead, supported by a strengthened MEAL framework designed to capture deeper insights and further evidence of change.

## CONVERGENCES | International Forums

In 2025, Acted and Convergences continued to engage local ecosystems at an international level, confirming the relevance and value of their multi-stakeholder 3ZERO approach. Three international forums organised in the Republic of the Congo, Tunisia and Brazil brought together more than 1,500 participants, thereby

creating spaces for dialogue, co-creation and the exchange of locally-rooted solutions. These initiatives brought together civil society, public institutions, private-sector stakeholders, academia and young people, thereby encouraging their cooperation and fostering inclusive, context-specific responses to shared challenges.

In France, Convergences has suspended its World Forum in order to review its formats and strengthen its role as a platform for ongoing, multi-stakeholder dialogue.

This transition lays the foundations for a renewed programme in 2026, rooted in local communities and linked to global agendas.



## Partnerships | For Impactful Cooperations

In defining and implementing its programmes around the world, Acted works closely with hundreds of local and national partners. In line with its multi-stakeholder approach, these organisations are not only drawn from civil society, but also include public institutions, research centres and private sector actors.

At the intersection of academic, civic and entrepreneurial dynamics, the 3ZERO Campus Clubs in Tunisia position themselves as movements for collective experimentation where the 3ZERO vision is brought to life in practice. They help to foster,

within universities, a continuum between education, engagement and career integration, bringing together students, lecturers, alumni, experts and partners around shared objectives.

The partnership with L'Hermitage has also continued, centred on a shared ambition: to transform the rural village of Autrêches into a key hub for experimentation, training and cooperation in support of the 3ZERO objective. 2025 marked a significant milestone in the preparation of the Campus 3ZERO project, conceived as a community dedicated to a just transition in rural areas. This momentum

has also opened up new avenues for cooperation with academic partners, particularly in relation to applied research, training and regional innovation projects.

Acted has also entered into a new strategic partnership with UniLaSalle, combining academic expertise in environmental sciences with operational experience in the field. This collaboration supports applied research, innovation and skills development, whilst offering students new opportunities through practical activities and international exchanges focused on a sustainable future.

## UZBEKISTAN

### **Advancing equality: integrated action against gender-based violence**

Despite ongoing reform processes, gender inequality and gender-based violence (GBV) remain persistent issues in Uzbekistan. Access to front-line services continues to be inconsistent, particularly in rural areas. Acted strengthens the capacities of civil society and local authorities to deliver survivor-centred, holistic support and reinforce GBV prevention and response systems. In 2025, Acted engaged local authorities, youth, private sector actors, and young families to expand access to integrated social, legal, and psychological services for women, while promoting awareness of rights and challenging harmful gender norms.



## AFGHANISTAN

### **Adapting to climate change: restoring livelihoods through sustainable practices**

Prolonged droughts, erratic rainfall, soil erosion and flash floods are steadily undermining rural livelihoods in northwestern Afghanistan. Acted supports community adaptation to climate change, linking income generation with ecosystem restoration. In 2025, 51,000 people benefitted from agriculture, livestock, water infrastructure and natural resource management activities designed to reinforcing local resilience to climate shocks.

## PAKISTAN

### **Building resilience: integrated support for climate-affected communities**

Pakistan faces recurring climate hazards: monsoon flooding, glacial lake outbursts floods and droughts contribute to displacement, loss of livelihoods and assets, and the depletion of natural resources, further exacerbating the vulnerabilities of the most marginalised populations. In 2025, Acted continued its efforts to build the resilience of communities and infrastructure, by improving access to essential services including health, water and sanitation, shelter and livelihoods, while also responding to the urgent needs of over 280,290 people affected by the floods across the country.

## KYRGYZSTAN

### Improving preparedness: strengthening systems for climate-driven shocks

In southern Kyrgyzstan, recurrent mudflows, floods, drought and earthquakes increasingly threaten communities with limited coping capacity. In Batken and Leilek districts, Acted supported area-based risk assessments, and training local responders and institutions to anticipate, plan for and respond more effectively to climate driven disasters.

44,000 people now live in communities benefiting from improved preparedness systems and contingency planning processes.



## TAJIKISTAN

### Scaling innovation: strengthening social entrepreneurship ecosystems

Innovative initiatives addressing social challenges often struggle to grow beyond small, isolated efforts in Tajikistan. Social entrepreneurs lack opportunities to showcase ideas, connect with private sector partners, and scale their solutions. Acted supports social entrepreneurship by strengthening entrepreneurial skills, creating collaboration platforms, and promoting partnerships and blended financing models. In 2025, these efforts contributed to the development and adoption of Tajikistan's Social Entrepreneurship Law.

## BANGLADESH

### Improving safety: integrated flood risk management in refugee camps

Since 2017, Acted has been engaged in Camp Coordination and Camp Management for the Rohingya crisis in Cox's Bazar - one of the largest refugee settlements in the world. Acted contributes to life-saving flood prevention and risk mitigation in the camps, including drainage monitoring, maintenance, and emergency interventions in highly flood-prone areas. Working closely with refugee communities to rehabilitate watersheds and restore degraded slopes, Acted helps build environmental resilience in one of the most fragile and densely populated ecosystems in the region.



## SRI LANKA

### Promoting innovation: circular economy solutions for sustainable livelihoods

Limited income opportunities strain prospects for young people in Sri Lanka. In parallel, mounting plastic waste threatens communities. Acted endeavours to tackle both issues. In 2025, the Colombo 3ZERO House ran initiatives on plastic management and circular economy, including an entrepreneurship programme and 3ZERO Hackathons to back local changemakers.

## MYANMAR

### Standing with communities: emergency relief in times of crisis

The 28 March 2025 earthquake caused devastating damage to communities already affected by the ongoing armed conflict in Myanmar. Acted launched a rapid relief programme for families affected by the earthquake, providing emergency cash assistance to over 60,000 people in Mandalay.

## PHILIPPINES

### Improving access: targeted support for underserved populations

In the Philippines, vulnerable populations in remote locations struggle to access essential relief following disasters. Acted works in hard-to-reach areas, to support those left behind by mainstream response actions. In 2025, Acted provided rapid humanitarian assistance to over 264,075 people affected by human induced, climate and natural hazards. Acted piloted innovative climate-adaptive sanitation models, stress testing against rigorous Value for Money credentials to build an evidence base for better disaster relief programming.



## THAILAND

### Creating opportunities: skills development for vulnerable refugee populations

Myanmar refugees have lived in camps along the Thai border for decades, with restricted mobility and few livelihood options to support themselves. Acted strengthens self-reliance for these vulnerable people by providing vocational training (business and digital skills) as well as financial support for refugee groups and women cooperatives to develop pig- and poultry-raising activities. In 2025, Acted supported 605 refugees—mostly women—with vocational, business and digital skills, and provided business grants to 60 graduates to start income generating activities.

## TÜRKIYE

### Promoting sustainability: the 3ZERO Village advancing inclusive recovery

Two years after the earthquakes that struck southeastern Türkiye, Acted continued supporting communities towards sustainable recovery. In 2025, Acted handed over the 3ZERO Village in Hatay - a hub hosting local businesses, cooperatives and community organisations dedicated to revitalising the earthquake-affected region - to local actors for continued community-led management.



## LEBANON

### Empowering youth: strengthening organisations for lasting impact

As Lebanon's civil society continues to play a critical role in responding to overlapping crises, Acted supported youth-led civil society organisations and start-ups through a comprehensive capacity-building program combining tailored training, mentoring, and sub-grants thereby reinforcing organisational sustainability and digital readiness.

## OCCUPIED PALESTINIAN TERRITORY

### Amid crisis: delivering life-saving support to displaced communities

2.1 million people are in need of humanitarian assistance in Gaza, where almost the entire population has been repeatedly displaced. In 2025, Acted delivered life-saving site management, food security, nutrition, cash, water and sanitation, and protection assistance to over 360,000 people in the Occupied Palestinian Territory.

## SYRIA

### Adapting to evolving displacement dynamics: area-based solutions for displaced and returning populations

Political change reshaped displacement dynamics across Syria in 2025, opening space for returns while creating new pressures on services. As movements accelerated, Acted adapted its response to support both people on the move and those unable to return. In camps, informal sites and areas of return, Acted delivered camp coordination, shelter support, water and sanitation, rehabilitation, and livelihoods support through an area-based approach, helping over 1.5 million people to navigate transition safely.

## IRAQ

### Addressing water scarcity: climate-smart solutions for sustainable livelihoods

In Thi Qar Governorate, Iraq, Acted is supporting farming communities and local authorities to address water scarcity and intensifying climate shocks. Through area-based risk analysis, capacity building, and farmer-led training, Acted supported 690 people in 2025 to strengthen their livelihoods. Agricultural tunnels, solar-powered drip irrigation systems, composting of household waste, and improved livestock care helped reduce water use, protect incomes, and enable families to remain on their land despite worsening drought conditions.



## JORDAN

### Restoring ecosystems: nature-based solutions for resilient livelihoods

In northern Jordan, soil erosion and land degradation threaten watersheds and rural livelihoods, increasing environmental vulnerability. Acted promotes nature-based solutions that restore ecosystems while engaging communities in land stewardship. In 2025, Acted worked with women from vulnerable Jordanian and Syrian households to produce more than 400,000 seedlings for national reforestation and watershed rehabilitation efforts - strengthening local livelihoods while contributing directly to ecosystem restoration and long-term environmental resilience.

## YEMEN

### Navigating crisis: delivering support in complex displacement contexts

Prolonged conflict has driven mass displacement in Yemen, with families living in camps under extremely precarious conditions, with limited access to basic services and sustainable solutions.

In this complex context, Acted delivers coordinated, multi-sectoral assistance through an area-based approach, focussing on strengthening local participation and supporting pathways toward durable solutions. In 2025, as part of the Yemen Displacement Response, Acted supported over 80,000 displacement-affected people across 101 displacement sites and surrounding communities.

## MALI

### Improving access: healthcare for the most vulnerable populations

In Mali, the protracted effects of insecurity and climate change continue to disrupt access to essential services, particularly in rural areas. In 2025, Acted worked to strengthen primary health care and community-based health systems in Koro and Ségou, which will enable over 69,000 people to access health and nutrition services with integrated protection support.

## BURKINA FASO

### Supporting sustainable community recovery amid displacement dynamics

In 2025, Burkina Faso faced internal displacement and return dynamics linked to the changing security context. Of the more than 2 million people affected in recent years, nearly 1.1 million had returned to their places of origin, highlighting the need to strengthen community response and management mechanisms more sustainably. Acted supported the efforts of authorities and communities through empowerment and community governance initiatives. Income-generating activities and support for local governance mechanisms helped improve the living conditions of more than 2,205 people.



## CÔTE D'IVOIRE

### Strengthening resilience: enhancing food security and income opportunities

In northern Côte d'Ivoire, climate variability and pressure on land are undermining agro-pastoral livelihoods in a region hosting over 80,000 asylum seekers from Burkina Faso and Mali. In 2025, Acted supported communities in Tchologo region through rapid-impact assets such as community gardens, strengthening food production and income diversification. By promoting shared, climate-adapted livelihood solutions for displaced and host populations, Acted helped build local resilience, reduce resource-related tensions and support longer-term stability.

## CHAD

### Supporting social cohesion: fostering peaceful coexistence in a context of mass displacement

The conflict in Sudan has driven a massive influx of refugees into eastern Chad, putting a strain on local services and community cohesion in the city of Adré. Acted provided emergency assistance to host and displaced communities, helping 141,170 people access improved support. Working with local authorities and community representatives to identify shared priorities and strengthen essential services also helped foster peaceful coexistence and sustainable recovery.



## CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC

### Supporting recovery pathways: bridging emergency response and long-term recovery efforts

Persistent insecurity and the presence of armed groups continue to undermine stability and social cohesion in Central African Republic, while former combatants face limited pathways back into civilian life. Acted responds to both emergency and development needs, delivering life-saving assistance in water and sanitation, food security and health, while promoting longer-term economic recovery. In 2025, 346 former combatants were supported to launch income-generating activities, and contribute to community infrastructure rehabs.



## DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF THE CONGO

### Strengthening resilience: meeting urgent needs in crisis-affected communities

Renewed fighting has displaced hundreds of thousands of households and disrupted livelihoods across eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo. In South Kivu and Tanganyika, Acted delivered coordinated emergency support to displaced and host communities, providing food, shelter, essential household items and protection assistance, helping 318,852 people meet urgent needs while strengthening community resilience amid ongoing insecurity.



## REPUBLIC OF THE CONGO

### Strengthening civic engagement: promoting inclusive governance

Limited citizen participation and weak dialogue between communities and local authorities continue to hinder inclusive and sustainable development in the Republic of Congo. In 2025, Acted worked with 30 civil society organisations (CSOs) through a series of trainings, technical support, and financial assistance to promote the participation of women, youth, and Indigenous people in local decision-making processes. 100% of targeted CSOs now feel more confident engaging in dialogue with public institutions.

## SUDAN

### Delivering life-saving support: responding to displacement and urgent humanitarian needs

Ongoing conflict in Sudan has triggered mass displacement and left millions in urgent need of most basic services. In camps and informal sites, Acted works with community committees and partners to deliver life-saving cash assistance and improve access to essential services, such as emergency latrines and shower facilities, site maintenance, safety audits, repairs of lights and shelters, and solid waste management.



## SOUTH SUDAN

### Facing environmental challenges: supporting sustainable livelihoods

In South Sudan, recurrent flooding, drought and climate variability continue to undermine food production and livelihoods. Acted supports climate-affected communities by rehabilitating climate-resilient infrastructure, promoting climate-smart agriculture and natural resource management, and strengthening local disaster preparedness systems. By linking emergency response with longer-term resilience, Acted helps households better protect their assets and sustain food production in the face of future shocks.



## UGANDA

### Improving climate-resilience: fostering food security and nutrition

Karamoja's semiarid districts face chronic food insecurity and high child malnutrition, driven by erratic rainfall and land degradation. Since 2008, Acted has been working in the region to deliver an integrated response linking cash, climate-smart agriculture and nutrition support. In 2025, Acted supported vulnerable households in Amudat and Nakapiripirit with cash support, farmer-led trainings, kitchen garden inputs and nutrition screenings for mothers and young children. Communities restored land through rainwater harvesting and farmer-led natural resource management to strengthen resilience.

## ETHIOPIA

### Improving services: improving access to water, sanitation and health

Refugee arrivals from Sudan continue to strain services in Benishangul-Gumuz region, where over 94,000 Sudanese refugees are hosted and camps such as Ura face acute gaps in water and health care. In Assosa Zone, Acted supported 32,258 refugees and host community members by solarising a borehole, constructing 15 inclusive latrines, delivering hygiene promotion to 20,000 people, and strengthening access to primary health and nutrition services.



## SOMALIA

### Strengthening inclusive dialogue: promoting governance and peacebuilding in fragile contexts

Decades of conflict, drought and displacement continue to fuel intercommunal tensions and exclude women from decision-making in south-central Somalia. In 2025, Acted worked with 8 women-led civil society organisations in South West State and Jubaland, building their capacity to lead community mediation, promote dialogue between clans and displaced groups, and advocate for women's inclusion in peace processes, fostering more inclusive and locally driven reconciliation.



## KENYA

### Enhancing adaptive capacity: tailoring cash distributions

Recurrent droughts, floods and climate shocks continue to drive acute food insecurity in Kenya's ASAL counties and refugee camps. Crisis-affected communities face reduced assistance, rising needs and limited coping options. Acted works with national and international partners to deliver adaptive, multipurpose cash assistance through an alert system, while strengthening coordination, market monitoring and disaster preparedness at county level. In 2025, Acted and its partners reached over 41,000 people with emergency cash assistance.



## MOZAMBIQUE

### Reaching vulnerable communities: operating in hard-to-access conflict zones

In Cabo Delgado province, ongoing insecurity continues to displace communities and severely disrupt access to food. Acted operates in remote and hard-to-reach areas, delivering emergency food assistance to the most vulnerable populations, supporting 39,085 conflict-affected households to meet their essential food needs in 2025.





## FRANCE

### Bridging the gap: environmental awareness and citizen action

Over 80% of people in France see environmental protection as essential, but people struggle to know how to make a difference. Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) can play a leading role in driving change at the local level, if they have the support and resources to boost citizen action. Acted builds on the deep roots that CSOs have in their local communities to promote science-based climate initiatives and mobilise disengaged communities. In 2025, Acted supported 20 CSOs across 8 regions on energy poverty, agroecology, circular economy and mobility.



## MAYOTTE

### From crisis to recovery: empowering communities in Mayotte

Following Cyclone Chido in December 2024, Acted sprang into action in response to the destruction of much-needed infrastructure, which had cut off a large part of the population from any aid. The organisation met the basic needs of the affected communities by distributing 145 tonnes of food (equivalent to one million meals) and providing 380 family tents. It also strengthened its response with the support of fire brigades specialising in humanitarian emergencies, who worked alongside Acted to deploy three drinking water filtration units and set up sanitation facilities benefiting over 10,000 people. At the same time, reconstruction and sustainable recovery initiatives were launched: Acted supported the continuity of education through 70 school tents and 786 back-to-school kits, whilst revitalising the local economy by supporting 64 micro-enterprises, 48 farmers and around ten community initiatives, benefiting nearly 8,000 people.

## UKRAINE

### Delivering assistance: Supporting frontline communities

The war continues to devastate frontline communities in Ukraine, where constant shelling, damaged infrastructure and disrupted markets leave households struggling to meet their basic needs. In 2025, Acted worked with rural and isolated communities along the contact line across 9 oblasts, delivering multipurpose cash to 29,638 households, heating support to 26,067 people and emergency livelihood grants to 5,984 people, helping families stabilise income and access essential goods.

## ARMENIA

### Supporting safe living conditions: strengthening access to housing and essential services

The arrival of refugees from Nagorno-Karabakh has placed significant pressure on rural border communities in Armenia, straining housing, protection services and winter preparedness. Acted supports displaced families and vulnerable host households through tailored protection assistance, shelter rehabilitation and winterisation support, helping people secure safe living conditions and access essential services during the cold season.



## MOLDOVA

### Tackling socio-economic vulnerability: supporting refugees and host communities

Moldova is one of the lowest income countries in Europe, with a significant portion of the population living below the poverty line. The country also hosts extremely vulnerable Ukrainian refugees, who often have limited coping options. Many face major protection risks and struggle to access essential services. Acted strengthens protection systems through monitoring, case management, socio-economic integration and targeted support for refugees and vulnerable Moldovan people at risk of exclusion, complementing national efforts and helping individuals secure safe access to assistance and services.

## HAITI

### Reaching the most affected: deploying mobile teams

Escalating gang violence, compounded by ongoing crises, has forced over 1.4 million people from their homes in Haiti, deepening humanitarian needs and making access highly volatile. To reach people affected by shocks both within displacement sites and outside of them, Acted deploys agile mobile teams delivering integrated, multisectoral emergency assistance, including cash for food, water and sanitation, and protection support.

## VENEZUELA

### Supporting vulnerable households: school-based assistance for communities

Widespread poverty and social marginalisation continue to undermine households' ability to meet their basic needs in Venezuela, putting children's nutrition and education at risk. Acted supports 144 schools through the National School Feeding Program, providing daily meals and complementary activities to help vulnerable children remain in school, while easing pressure on household food security.

## TUNISIA

### Empowering youth: supporting inclusive and green innovation

Youth unemployment and limited civic space hinder social and environmental innovation in Tunisia, especially outside major urban centres. Through 3ZERO campus clubs, Acted mobilises students as agents of change, to promote green entrepreneurship and inclusion. In 2025, the 3ZERO network supported 354 students from 16 universities. A 3ZERO Innovation Prize was awarded to three student-led innovation projects.



## LIBYA

### Building capacity: fostering civic innovation

Civil society in Libya is continuing to develop within a challenging environment. Many local CSOs struggle to coordinate, sustain activities and engage in local decision making. Acted brings nascent and burgeoning CSOs together in Resource Centres across the country, to participate in skills training, networking events, and organisational capacity building. In 2025, Acted supported 60 CSOs in four Resource Centres – while the 3ZERO House in Benghazi promoted innovation, circular economy and green civic action among young people.



## MOROCCO

### Supporting long term recovery: resilient reconstruction

Communities hit by the 2023 earthquake in Morocco are moving into a longer-term recovery phase, while still facing damaged housing, fragile infrastructure, disrupted livelihoods and pressure on local economic activity. Acted's approach focuses on "Build Back Better," combining safer reconstruction with the restoration of resilient and sustainable services, while supporting livelihoods.

In 2025, Acted trained local workers in earthquake-resistant techniques rooted in traditional architecture, contributing to stronger, safer homes and reinforcing community capacity to maintain and adapt infrastructure over time.





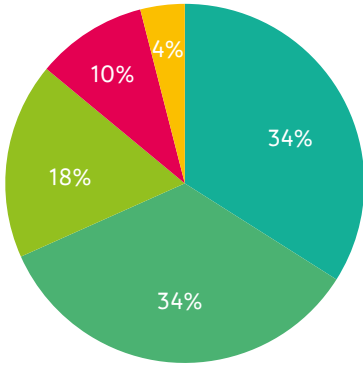

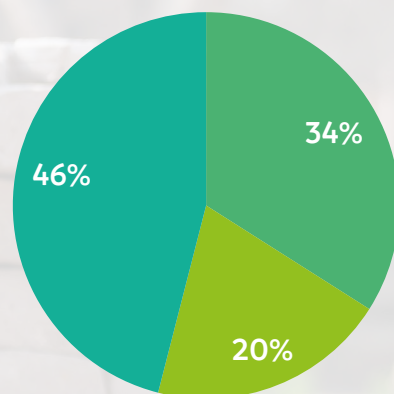


BUDGET SHARE PER REGION



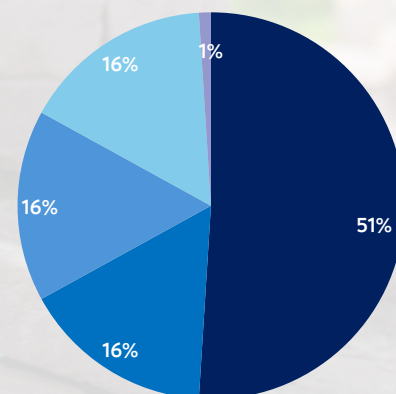

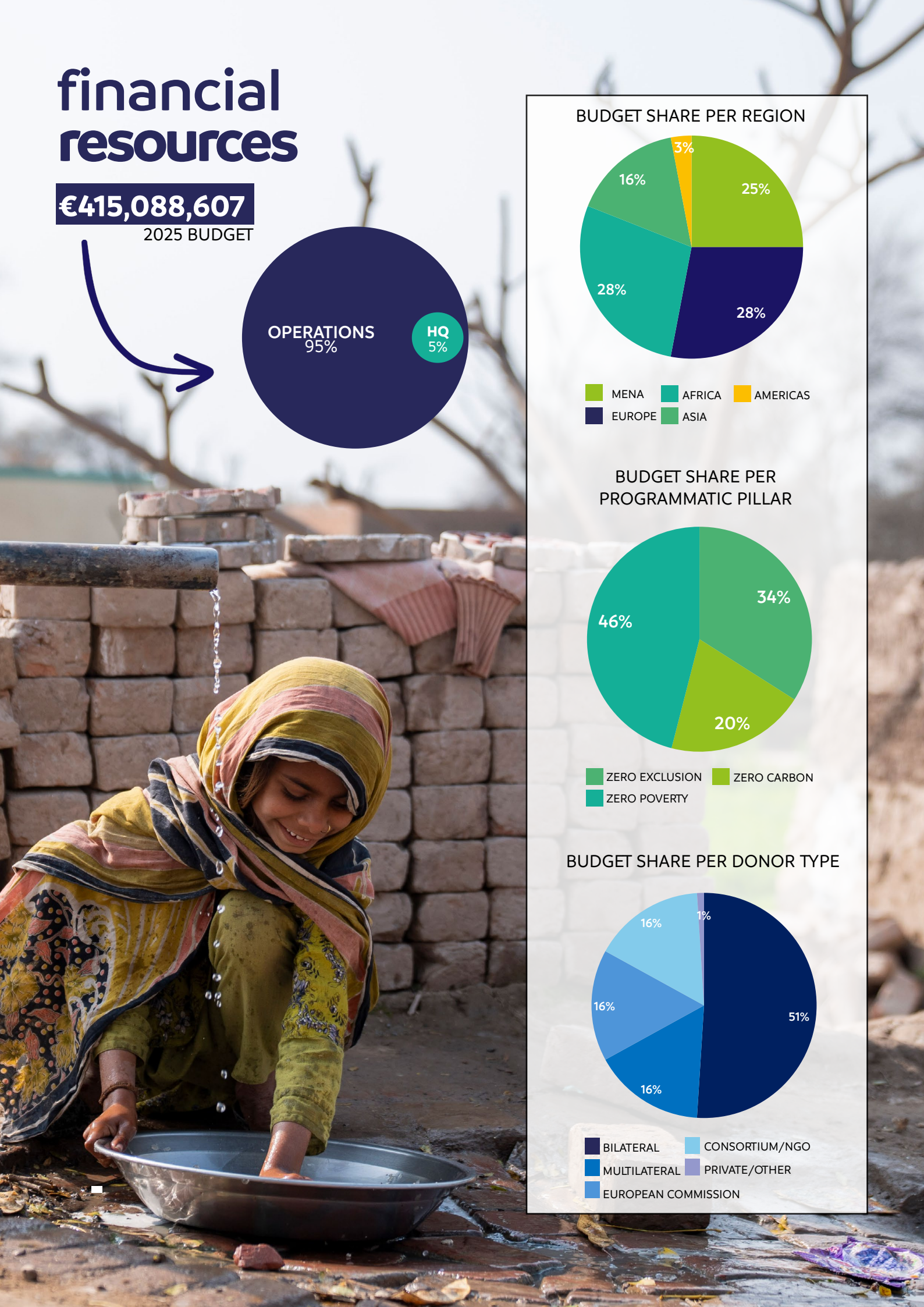

# accountability & transparency

Acted maintains a strong **compliance** framework based on robust internal controls and full traceability of financial and operational flows, from initial funding to the final beneficiary. These systems are complemented by independent external audits, providing a third level of oversight. In 2025, more than **347 projects** were audited. **Acted achieved a 99.9% eligibility rate of audited expenditures**, with confirmed ineligible costs remaining below 0.1% of its annual budget. These results reflect the reliability of control mechanisms and a high level of accountability in the use of funds.

The Acted Feedback Mechanism is an accountability system managed by Acted MEAL units in each mission. It is designed to support the participation of affected populations, and to use community feedback to improve the quality and relevance of our programmes.

Acted's transparency mechanism is designed to capture and address alerts related to fraud and abuse through a structured and centralised process. Managed by the Transparency, Compliance and Investigation Department, it ensures confidentiality and consistent case management.
